In the course of preparing your Proposal, it shall remain your responsibility to ensure that it reaches the address above on or before the deadline. Proposals that are received by UNDP after the deadline indicated above, for whatever reason, shall not be considered for evaluation.

Services proposed shall be reviewed and evaluated based on completeness and compliance of the Proposal and responsiveness with the requirements of the RFP and all other annexes providing details of UNDP requirements.

The Proposal that complies with all of the requirements, meets all the evaluation criteria and offers the best value for money shall be selected and awarded the contract. Any offer that does not meet the requirements shall be rejected.

	People with drug use problems often face dehumanizing		
	discriminatory manners and encounter health-care systems		
	that are reluctant to provide services to them. ¹ Stigma against		
	women with drug use problems starts from within the family		
	resulting early loss of their social and family support.

	negative self-perceptions further deterring their referral to		
	harm reduction and health care services and impacts the self-

	Besides the massive problem of drug use the national		
	response in Iran has been vast in terms of establishing		
	treatment and harm reduction services. According to latest		
	reports of the DCHQ on Drug Control in Iran there are over		
	7,000 treatment centres providing various treatment		
	modalities in outpatient and residential settings in the country		
Context of the Requirement	to about 1,000,000 of people seeking drug use treatment.		
	Moreover ca. 100,000 people with drug use disorders are		
	receiving harm reduction services throughout the country.		
	These statistics are not disaggregated by sex and so the		
	number of women receiving treatment and harm reduction		
	services is not known well. Such women-only drug harm		
	reduction and treatment centres have been established in the		
	country since 2000's. Still factors influencing service		
	utilization need to be addressed and barriers to access of		
	services need to be eliminated to ensure proper effectiveness		
	of the services ³ . Many studies conducted in the country		
	appraise that women with drug use disorders are		
	underrepresented among clients referring to treatment and		
	harm reduction services. The same studies attribute the		
	underutilization of these services to: the high levels of stigma		
	and discrimination, the complexity of life situations of the		
	women involved in drug use and required psychosocial and		
	motivational interventions and the lack of responsiveness of		
	mouvational interventions and the lack of responsiveness of

Annex IV General Terms and Conditions for Services

1.0 LEGAL STATUS:

The Contractor shall be considered as having the legal status of an independent contractor vis-à-vis the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP). The Contractor's personnel and sub-contractors shall not be considered in any respect as being the employees or agents of UNDP or the United Nations.

2.0 SOURCE OF INSTRUCTIONS:

The Contractor shall neither seek nor accept instructions from any authority external to UNDP in connection with the performance of its services under this Contract. The Contractor shall refrain from any action that may adversely affect UNDP or the United Nations and shall fulfill its commitments with the fullest regard to the interests of UNDP.

3.0 CONTRACTOR'S RESPONSIBILITY FOR EMPLOYEES:

The Contractor shall be responsible for the professional and technical competence of its employees and will select, for work under this Contract, reliable individuals who will perform effectively in the implementation of this Contract, respect the local customs, and conform to a high standard of moral and ethical conduct.

4.0 ASSIGNMENT:

The Contractor shall not assign, transfer, pledge or make other disposition of this Contract or any part thereof, or any of the Contractor's rights, claims or obligations under this Contract except with the prior written consent of UNDP.

5.0 SUB-CONTRACTING:

In the event the Contractor requires the services of sub-contractors, the Contractor shall obtain the prior written approval and clearance of UNDP for all sub-contractors. The approval of UNDP of a sub-contractor shall not relieve the Contractor of any of its obligations under this Contract. The terms of any sub-contract shall be subject to and conform to the provisions of this Contract.

6.0 OFFICIALS NOT TO BENEFIT:

The Contractor warrants that no official of UNDP or the United Nations has received or will be offered by the Contractor any direct or indirect benefit arising from this Contract or the award thereof. The Contractor agrees that breach of this provision is a breach of an essential term of this Contract.

7.0 **INDEMNIFICATION**:

The Contractor shall indemnify, hold and save harmless, and defend, at its own expense, UNDP, its officials, agents, servants and employees from and against all suits, claims, demands, and liability of any nature or kind, including their costs and expenses, arising out of acts or omissions of the Contractor, or the Contractor's employees, officers, agents or sub-contractors, in the performance of this Contract. This provision shall extend, inter alia, to claims and liability in the nature of workmen's compensation, products liability and liability arising out of the use of patented inventions or devices, copyrighted material or other intellectual property by the Contractor, its employees, officers, agents, servants or sub-contractors. The obligations under this Article do not lapse upon termination of this Contract.



8.0 INSURANCE AND LIABILITIES TO THIRD PARTIES:

- **8.1** The Contractor shall provide and thereafter maintain insurance against all risks in respect of its property and any equipment used for the execution of this Contract.
- **8.2** The Contractor shall provide and thereafter maintain all appropriate workmen's compensation insurance, or the equivalent, with respect to its employees to cover claims for personal injury or death in connection with this Contract.
- **8.3** The Contractor shall also provide and thereafter maintain liability insurance in an adequate amount to cover third party claims for death or bodily injury, or loss of or damage to property, arising from or in connection with the provision of services under this Contract or the operation of any vehicles, boats, airplanes or other equipment owned or leased by the Contractor or its agents, servants, employees or sub-contractors performing work or services in connection with this Contract.
- 8.4 Except for the workmen's compensation insurance, the insurance policies under this Article shall:
- **8.4.1** Name UNDP as additional insured;
- 8.4.2 Include a waiver of subrogation of the Contractor's rights to the insurance carrier against the UNDP;
- **8.4.3** Provide that the UNDP shall receive thirty (30) days written notice from the insurers prior to any cancellation or change of coverage.
- **8.5** The Contractor shall, upon request, provide the UNDP with satisfactory evidence of the insurance required under this Article.

9.0 ENCUMBRANCES/LIENS:

The Contractor shall not cause or permit any lien, attachment or other encumbrance by any person to be placed on file or to remain on file in any public office or on file with the UNDP against any monies due or to become due for any work done or materials furnished under this Contract, or by reason of any other claim or demand against the Contractor.

10.0 TITLE TO EQUIPMENT:

Title to any equipment and supplies that may be furnished by UNDP shall rest with UNDP and any such equipment shall be returned to UNDP at the conclusion of this Contract or when no longer needed by the Contractor. Such equipment, when returned to UNDP, shall be in the same condition as when delivered to the Contractor, subject to normal wear and tear. The Contractor shall be liable to compensate UNDP for equipment determined to be damaged or degraded beyond normal wear and tear.

- **11.1** Except as is otherwise expressly provided in writing in the Contract, the UNDP shall be entitled to all intellectual property and other proprietary rights including, but not limited to, patents, copyrights, and trademarks, with regard to products, processes, inventions, ideas, know-how, or documents and other materials which the Contractor has developed for the UNDP under the Contract and which bear a direct relation to or are produced or prepared or collected in consequence of, or during the course of, the performance of the Contract, and the Contractor acknowledges and agrees that such products, documents and other materials constitute works made for hire for the UNDP.
- **11.2** To the extent that any such intellectual property or other proprietary rights consist of any intellectual property or other proprietary rights of the Contractor: (i) that pre-existed the performance by the Contractor of its obligations under the Contract, or (ii) that the Contractor may develop or acquire, or may have developed or acquired, independently of the performance of its obligations under the



Contract, the UNDP does not and shall not claim any ownership interest thereto, and the Contractor grants to the UNDP a perpetual license to use such intellectual property or other proprietary right solely for the purposes of and in accordance with the requirements of the Contract.

- **11.3** At the request of the UNDP; the Contractor shall take all necessary steps, execute all necessary documents and generally assist in securing such proprietary rights and transferring or licensing them to the UNDP in compliance with the requirements of the applicable law and of the Contract.

- **13.1** The recipient ("Recipient") of such information shall:
- **13.1.1** use the same care and discretion to avoid disclosure, publication or dissemination of the Discloser's Information as it uses with its own similar information that it does not wish to disclose, publish or disseminate; and,
- **13.1.2** use the Discloser's Information solely for the purpose for which it was disclosed.
- **13.2** Provided that the Recipient has a written agreement with the following persons or entities requiring them to treat the Information confidential in accordance with the Contract and this Article 13, the Recipient may disclose Information to:
- **13.2.1** any other party with the Discloser's prior written consent; and,
- **13.2.2** the Recipient's employees, officials, representatives and agents who have a need to know such Information for purposes of performing obligations under the Contract, and employees officials, representatives and agents of any legal entity that it controls controls it, or with which it is under common control, who have a need to know such Information for purposes of performing obligations under the Contract, provided that, for these purposes a controlled legal entity means:
- **13.2.2.1** a corporate entity in which the Party owns or otherwise controls, whether directly or indirectly, over fifty percent (50%) of voting shares thereof; or,

13.2.2.2 any entity over which the Party exercises effective managerial control; or,



13.2.2.3 for the UNDP, an affiliated Fund such as UNCDF, UNIFEM and UNV.

- **13.3** The Contractor may disclose Information to the extent required by law, provided that, subject to and without any waiver of the privileges and immunities of the United Nations, the Contractor will give the UNDP sufficient prior notice of a request for the disclosure of Information in order to allow the UNDP to have a reasonable opportunity to take protective measures or such other action as may be appropriate before any such disclosure is made.

- **13.6** These obligations and restrictions of confidentiality shall be effective during the term of the Contract, including any extension thereof, and, unless otherwise provided in the Contract, shall remain effective following any termination of the Contract.

14.0 FORCE MAJEURE; OTHER CHANGES IN CONDITIONS

14.1 In the event of and as soon as possible after the occurrence of any cause constituting force majeure, the Contractor shall give notice and full particulars in writing to the UNDP, of such occurrence or change if the Contractor is thereby rendered unable, wholly or in part, to perform its obligations and meet its responsibilities under this Contract. The Contractor shall also notify the UNDP of any other changes in conditions or the occurrence of any event that interferes or threatens to interfere with its performance of this Contract. On receipt of the notice required under this Article, the UNDP shall take such action as, in its sole discretion; it considers to be appropriate or necessary in the circumstances, including the granting to the Contractor of a reasonable extension of time in which to perform its obligations under this Contract.

14.2 If the Contractor is rendered permanently unable, wholly, or in part, by reason of force majeure to perform its obligations and meet its responsibilities under this Contract, the UNDP shall have the right to suspend or terminate this Contract on the same terms and conditions as are provided for in Article 15, "Termination", except that the period of notice shall be seven (7) days instead of thirty (30) days.

- **15.1** Either party may terminate this Contract for cause, in whole or in part, upon thirty (30) days notice, in writing, to the other party. The initiation of arbitral proceedings in accordance with Article 16.2 ("Arbitration"), below, shall not be deemed a termination of this Contract.
- **15.2** UNDP reserves the right to terminate without cause this Contract at any time upon 15 days prior written notice to the Contractor, in which case UNDP shall reimburse the Contractor for all reasonable costs incurred by the Contractor prior to receipt of the notice of termination.
- **15.3** In the event of any termination by UNDP under this Article, no payment shall be due from UNDP to the Contractor except for work and services satisfactorily performed in conformity with the express terms of this Contract.
- **15.4** Should the Contractor be adjudged bankrupt, or be liquidated or become insolvent, or should the Contractor make an assignment for the benefit of its creditors, or should a Receiver be appointed on account of the insolvency of the Contractor, the UNDP may, without prejudice to any other right or remedy it may have under the terms of these conditions, terminate this Contract forthwith. The Contractor shall immediately inform the UNDP of the occurrence of any of the above events.

16.0 SETTLEMENT OF DISPUTES

- **16.1 Amicable Settlement**: The Parties shall use their best efforts to settle amicably any dispute, controversy or claim arising out of this Contract or the breach, termination or invalidity thereof. Where the parties wish to seek such an amicable settlement through conciliation, the conciliation shall take place in accordance with the UNCITRAL Conciliation Rules then obtaining, or according to such other procedure as may be agreed between the parties.
- 16.2 Arbitration: Any dispute, controversy, or claim between the Parties arising out of the Contract or the breach, termination, or invalidity thereof, unless settled amicably under Article 16.1, above, within sixty (60) days after receipt by one Party of the other Party's written request for such amicable settlement, shall be referred by either Party to arbitration in accordance with the UNCITRAL Arbitration Rules then obtaining. The decisions of the arbitral tribunal shall be based on general principles of international commercial law. For all evidentiary questions, the arbitral tribunal shall be guided by the Supplementary Rules Governing the Presentation and Reception of Evidence in International Commercial Arbitration of the International Bar Association, 28 May 1983 edition. The arbitral tribunal shall be empowered to order the return or destruction of goods or any property, whether tangible or intangible, or of any confidential information provided under the Contract, order the termination of the Contract, or order that any other protective measures be taken with respect to the goods, services or any other property, whether tangible or intangible, or of any confidential information provided under the Contract, as appropriate, all in accordance with the authority of the arbitral tribunal pursuant to Article 26 ("Interim Measures of Protection") and Article 32 ("Form and Effect of the Award") of the UNCITRAL Arbitration Rules. The arbitral tribunal shall have no authority to award punitive damages. In addition, unless otherwise expressly provided in the Contract, the arbitral tribunal shall have no authority to award interest in excess of the London Inter-Bank Offered Rate ("LIBOR") then prevailing, and any such interest shall be simple interest only. The Parties shall be bound by any arbitration award rendered as a result of such arbitration as the final adjudication of any such dispute, controversy, or claim.



17.0 PRIVILEGES AND IMMUNITIES:

Nothing in or relating to this Contract shall be deemed a waiver, express or implied, of any of the privileges and immunities of the United Nations, including its subsidiary organs.

18.0 TAX EXEMPTION

- **18.1** Section 7 of the Convention on the Privileges and Immunities of the United Nations provides, inter-alia that the United Nations, including its subsidiary organs, is exempt from all direct taxes, except charges for public utility services, and is exempt from customs duties and charges of a similar nature in respect of articles imported or exported for its official use. The Contractor shall comply with all laws, ordinances, rules, and regulations bearing upon the performance of its obligations under the terms of this Contract.

Background and Context

Iran is heavily affected by the problem of drug use, with one of the highest rates of opiate use in the world⁷ and a significant prevalence of Amphetamine -Type Stimulants (ATS) use. A household epidemiological survey in the country conducted in 2015 estimates the life-time prevalence of drug use among the women aged 15-64 years at about 1.5% and the Iranian Drug Control Headquarters (DCHQ) has estimated that women comprise about 10% of people who use drugs in the country. While no disaggregated statistics are documented, the Director General of the Treatment and Social Support of the DCHQ has estimated the number of women with current drug use disorders in Iran around 156,000 in his interviews with the press. Women to men ratio in use of stimulants seems to be higher than in the use of opiates. [e.g. ⁸]

People with drug use problems often face dehumanizing discriminatory manners and encounter health-care systems that are reluctant to provide services to them.⁹ Stigma against women with drug use problems starts from within the family resulting early loss of their social and family support. Moreover, women with addiction often internalise this external stigma reproaching themselves giving way to negative self-perceptions further deterring their referral to harm reduction and health care services and impacts the self-efficacy of these women even more negatively.¹⁰

Besides the massive problem of drug use the national response in Iran has been vast in terms of establishing treatment and harm reduction services. According to latest reports of the DCHQ on Drug Control in Iran there are over 7,000 treatment centres providing various treatment modalities in outpatient and residential settings in the country to about 1,000,000 of people seeking drug use treatment. Moreover ca. 100,000 people with drug use disorders are receiving harm reduction services throughout the country. These statistics are not disaggregated by sex and so the number of women receiving treatment and harm reduction services is not known well. Such women-only drug harm reduction and treatment centres have been established in the country since 2000's. Still factors influencing service utilization need to be addressed and barriers to access of services need to be eliminated to ensure proper effectiveness of the services ¹¹. Many studies conducted in the country appraise that women with drug use disorders are underrepresented among clients referring

to treatment and harm reduction services. The same studies attribute the underutilisation of these services to: the high levels of stigma and discrimination, the complexity of life situations of the women involved in drug use and required psychosocial and motivational interventions and the lack of responsiveness of the services to the special needs of these women in the first place.¹²

The global literature shows extensive evidence of the differences between women and men regarding substance use. Studies show that women who start using drugs are more susceptible to develop an addiction. Women are also more vulnerable to drug-related pathologies and are more exposed to sexual and physical abuse and violence and to sexually transmitted infections like HIV. The percentage of women in addiction treatment is very low. Women often encounter various personal, social, cultural, and structural barriers to entering treatment, such as a lack of treatment for pregnant women, low level of education, psychiatric disorders, history of trauma, stigma, discrimination, shame, poverty, child care duties, low social support, lack of services in accordance with women's needs, high treatment cost, and rigid treatment schedules.

The most evident fact in the area of drug use among women in Iran and its treatment is that reliable statistics are not available. Moreover, information on existing and current services are scarce. The DCHQ Drug Control Report 2014 lists all 75 women-only drug treatment and harm reduction centres operational in the country comprising of: 10 counselling centres, 11 night shelters (for homeless women who use drugs), 17 harm reduction drop-in Centres and 37 Short-term Residential drug treatment centres. Since then additional centres have been established, but their full list is not available. Much less is known about quality aspects and coverage of their services. Several studies in the area of women and drug use have concluded that women with drug use problems do not access existing services because they are not user-friendly and not tailored to their needs. The present activity envisages assessing existing services together with unmet needs of women with drug use disorders.

The present activity is funded graciously by the Kingdom of Norway under the IRN/Z78 project. It aims contributing to collection of necessary information on the characteristics and needs of women who use drugs for entering treatment programmes and continue treatment and recovery. The first phase shall cover the two provinces of Tehran and Alborz with additional provinces to follow in the second phase.

Duration of work

The work will be accomplished from 1 November- 31 March 2022.

Location:

The work will be conducted in Tehran and Alborz provinces in Iran.

<u>Tasks</u>

It is expected that the contracted institute sets-up a research team led by a head consultant and assesses characteristics and need of women with drug use disorders for entering and adhering in treatment based on a combined quantitative and qualitative methodology.

- 1. Maps all women-only voluntary drug use disorders treatment facilities in the Tehran and Alborz provinces by locality, assessing the services qualitatively and quantitively specifying:
 - a) Description of the treatment facility and treatment offered encompassing entry assessment, treatment plan, pharmaceutical and non-pharmaceutical therapeutic, rehabilitative and follow-up modalities together with services for small children and pregnant women.
 - b) Estimate of number of women treated on a monthly basis together with an estimate on women in waiting lists.
 - c) Estimate on the retention in treatment rates within six months.
 - d) Treatment capacity (buildings, and staff)
 - e) Approximate treatment cost per person/month and the source of financing (government, insurance, public and private fees)
